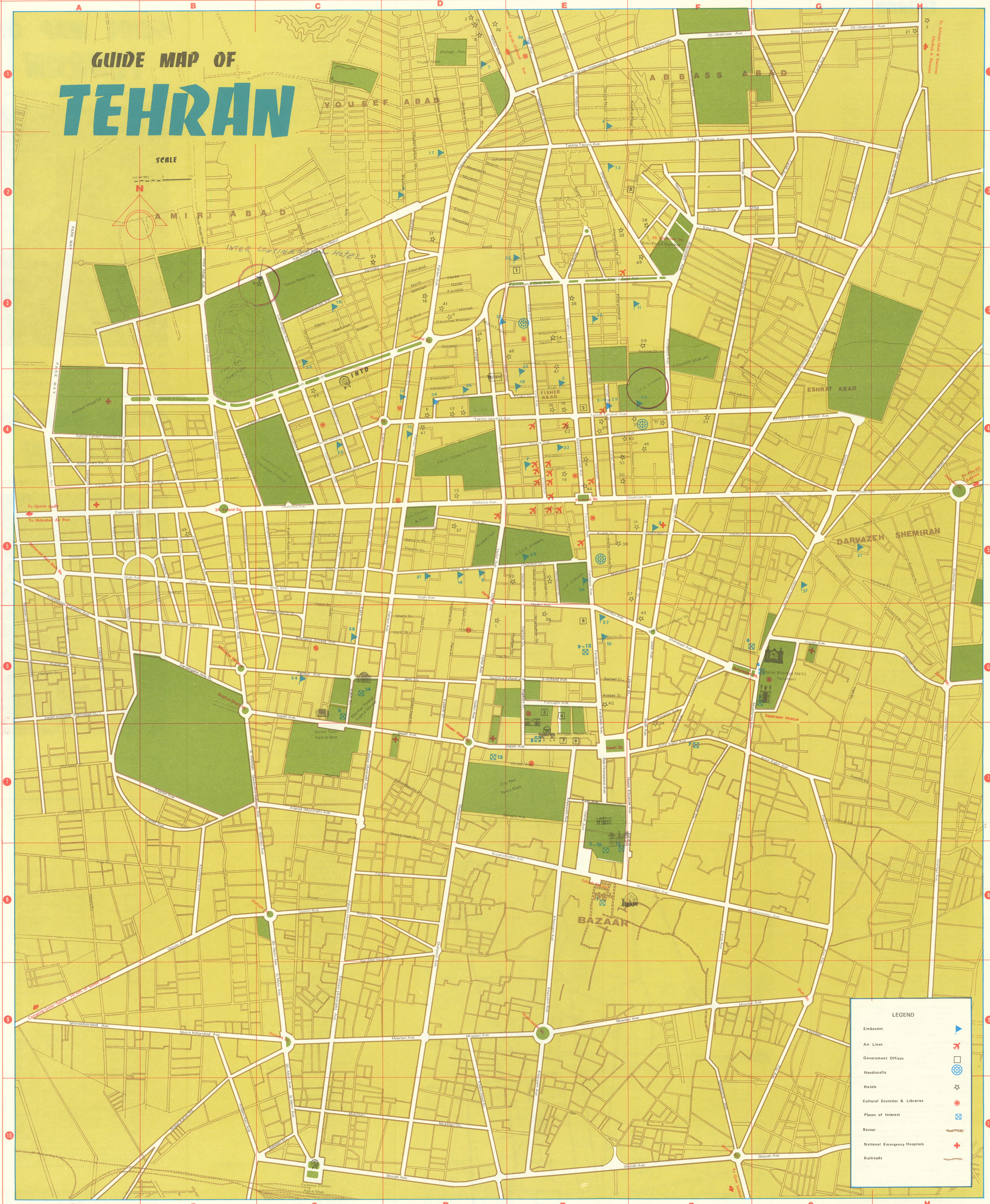


GUIDE MAP OF TEHRAN

TEHRAN

TEHRAN — a modern metropolis in an ancient land — is something of a phenomenon. In the past three decades it has been one of the fastest growing capitals of the world. The population has reached 3.5 million, and is steadily climbing. Behind this great growth — you can see it everywhere in skyscrapers, freeways, hotels — lies the forward thrust of industrialization in a developing country. For visitors the result is a panorama of exciting contrasts, a curious intermingling of Occident and Orient, a lively multi-faceted city. While Iran has been the stage of past civilization, Tehran is today's center of integrated art and culture, dynamic commerce and modern telecommunication. And as a headquarters city for growing tourism, it is now replete with up-to-date amenities and facilities comparable to those of European cities.

HISTORY — Tehran has been the capital city since 1783. It may date back as far as the 9th century A.D., but in its first centuries, the town was overshadowed by its next-door neighbor, the great city of Rey. Tehran really began to prosper after Rey was destroyed by the Mongols in 1197 A.D. and the survivors came to Tehran. A provincial city of comparative obscurity for many years, Tehran made Persia's capital by the first of the Qajar Shahs in 1783. After the overthrow of the Qajar dynasty in 1925, the new Pahlavi monarch, Reza Shah the Great, kept Tehran as his capital. He initiated many social reforms that changed the face of the country. In World War II Reza Shah's son Mohammad Reza Pahlavi acceded to the throne and Tehran's social progress continued to advance at a rapid rate. Today, the capital of Iran is the city of the Shah of Iran, the Shah of the royal residence of H.J.M. The Shahanshah Aryamehr, his Empress and their four children.

LOCATION & CLIMATE — Tehran lies at the foot of the magnificent Alborz Mountains, in the Central Province which stretches over 12,000 square miles on a high, dry sunny plateau. The city's elevation at Mehrabad Airport is 3,931 feet above sea level and northward at Darband suburb rises to almost 6,000 feet. Iran is one of the highest countries in the world. The city area has sprawled over the plain to 5 times its size of 30 years ago. Sunshine drenches the plateau most days of the year, but there are definite seasonal changes. While summers are hot, humidity is low. Winters have short freezing periods. Ideal traveling is in spring and fall. The temperature range is from 14°C. (57°F.) to 27°C. (80°F.); in spring from 21°C. (70°F.) to 35°C. (95°F.); in summer from 5°C. (41°F.) to 17°C. (63°F.); in fall from 1°C. (34°F.) to 11°C. (52°F.); in winter. There are occasional snowfalls. Tehran's rainfall averages about 9 inches annually.

PEOPLE — The people of Iran are Moslems of the Shiite sect. There are minorities of Armenians, Assyrians, Jews, Zoroastrians and others. The people are renowned for their traditional hospitality, individualism and sense of humor. While they respond warmly to Western civilization, they are proud and devoted to their own culture.

ACCOMMODATIONS — Tehran has 80 hotels; ranging from the deluxe Hilton, Inter-Continental, Park and Arya Sheraton to pensions and youth hostels. Listings available at INTVO offices. Hotel prices go by star ratings.

The camp nearest Tehran is Gole Sahr, 10 kms south of Savah Road (on way to Ufalan).

FOOD — Tehran has plentiful international cuisine. But the tourist's delight is discovering Persian food with its great variety and delicacy of flavor. Iran's long-irrigated rice, cooked a special way, is the mainstay. The national dish, *chelo kabab*, succulent charcoal-broiled lamb served on fluffy rice, should be sampled. Also try Persian Gulf shrimp and fresh caviar.

SHOPPING — Most shops are open from 8:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m., closed on Fridays. Tehran's bazaars and many handicraft shops offer a virtual paradise for souvenir seekers. The government's Handicrafts Center has two fine stores with fixed price, packing-export service. 381 Takht-e Jamshid Ave. (across from American Embassy); (4-F) and 290 Villa Ave. (3-E). Several shops are on Soray Ave. For carpets the state-owned Iran Carpet Company, 160 Ferdowsi Ave. (5-E) has a wide selection. While Tehran's best carpet bazaar at Sabzeh Meidan (8-E) has everything under the Persian sun, best buys: carpets and carpet tote bags, pustihs (sheepskin apparel), batik silks, hand-blocked cottons, embroidered cloths, pottery and ceramics, metal and enamel work, miniature paintings, inlaid work on boxes, jewelry (tribal, turquoise, emeralds, agates), Baluchestan embroidery, stoneware and hand-blown glass.

CURRENCY — Rial is monetary unit; toman colloquial denomination (10 Rls.) The rate of exchange, is 67.5 Rls. for one U.S. dollar. The Bank Markazi (Central Bank), Ferdowsi Ave. (6-E) — 8 — issues daily exchange rates. The Bank Mellî (National Bank) and most banks exchange travelers' checks.

GETTING AROUND TOWN. If Tehran traffic frightens you, the taxi fares will console you. Still the cheapest in the world. Tehran has 3 kinds of taxis:

- Orange, metered, Group riding is common in rush hours. Meter begins at 10 Rls. for one or two persons; at 15 Rls. for three. Every 333 meters of distance costs 1 Rial. If someone is in the taxi when you get in, be sure to read the meter and subtract this figure from the end amount. You pay 5 rials extra for luggage placed in the trunk.
- Blue, service taxis that operate on main avenues for a set price of 7 Rials, 5 passengers ride at once.
- Telephone taxis, more expensive but available 24 hours. Tel: 840011-20; return call confirms. Initial charge 20 Rials; 6 Rls. per each kilometer.

Try a city bus if you can't find a taxi. The bus stops are identified by circular blue signs with a large P and the route number is in white. Tickets are purchased at the kiosk near the stop. Bus routes are not posted. Tehran has 3 kinds of buses:

- Mini-buses, 5 Rls. (Yellow and Red).
- Green buses, 5 Rls. (New, uncrowded).
- Double-decker and regular buses, 2 Rls. (Blue, or red and yellow, usually crowded with workers).

OUT OF TOWN EXCURSIONS. The Alborz Valleys just behind Tehran provide lovely hikes and picnic spots. Start at Darband. Tehran has many lovely parks: **Farah Park** (4-B) on Elizabeth Blvd. and Los Angeles Ave. **Saai Park** on upper Pahlavi Ave. **City Park** (Park-e Shahr), (7-E) just south of Sepah Ave. between Hafez Ave. and Niyavari Ave. near government buildings. **Niavaran Park**, at the end of Saffarabad Rd., **Park Shahanshah**, near zoo on road near Niavaran Park. **Manzarshah Camp**, used by Boy Scouts, on road near Niavaran Park. (East of Tajrish) is pleasant picnic spot.

SCENIC EXCURSIONS. The countryside around Tehran offers some interesting scenery. Flat sweeping plains to the west, the desert (Dahke Kavir) to the south, and the snow-capped Alborz Mountains to the north and northeast. Not far by car are:

- Karaj, 46 kms. west of Tehran on great freeway.
Karaj Dam, 61 kms. farther along Karaj River, for boating and water skiing.
Alborz Game Reserve. 2-hour drive, near Dizin ski resort, for fishing and camping.
Ab-e Ali, 60 kms. east, ski resort in winter, refuge in summer, mineral springs.
Ab-e Garm, lovely village 28 kms. from Polour; excellent Spa.
Demnava Village, charming; turn right at Ab-e Ali, Road at Rudhen.
Rey, 12 kms. from Tehran, site of ancient Rhages, and tombs of Reza Shah the Great; carpet washing; shrine the son of 8th Imam.
Shemshak, mountain ski and summer resort, 60 kms. Tourist Inn, cable car rides.
Varamin, 37 kms. east, remains of old city after earthquake; beautiful Jame Mosque.
Caspian Seaside, 4 hours from Tehran through enchanting scenery. Sandy shoreline, clean blue waters; excellent summer resorts. Famous resorts Ramar, Babolar, Band-e Pahlavi, Now Shahr and Chalus. Iran Air has special flights to Ramar. In Ramar mineral health spa, new casino. Three main roads: Chalus, Haraz and Rasht.

INTVO and several travel agencies offer city tours and excursions around Iran. Iran Safaris has a variety of sporting expeditions. Tel: 778212. Check with INTVO Information Office Tel: 621290 for current tours available.

TRAVEL — The car-hire way of travel is good for out-of-town excursions. Rent a self-drive or ask for English-speaking driver. With driver, 150 Rls. first hour, 120 Rls. each hour after. BY BUS. The cheap and popular way to travel. Discounts given to groups. Two big companies among many are Mihan Tour, Ferdowsi Jonoubi Ave. Tel: 393084; T.B.T. Sepahbod Zahedi Ave. Tel: 821021-23.

BY RAIL. European trains now come directly to Iran through Turkey, with weekly service. Students traveling to Istanbul from Tehran can get a 50% fare reduction. The Iranian States Railway connects all major cities and has daily services between Tehran, Tabriz, Ahwaz, Khorramshahr, Gorgan, and Mashad. Service to Isfahan will start soon. Students and tourist groups can enjoy 30% discounts. Contact INTVO or Railway Station Information Tel: 531051. The station ("Tiqah-e Rake-Ahan") is at the end of Amirshah (Pahlavi Ave.).

BY AIR. Iran Air, the National airline of Iran, has its main office at 44 Villa Ave., Tel: 979011-15. It operates a network of flights to 20 countries and 16 cities within Iran. Air Taxi Service is available for outlying areas. Airport Information Tel: 667775.

BY CAR. The Imperial Automobile Club of Iran at 37 Varzesh Ave. (7-E) across from the City Park (Park-e Shahr) can give you information on driving through Iran. Tel: 48343. Cost of petrol (gas) in oilrich Iran is only 6 Rls. per litre; super 7.5 Rls.

GOLESTAN PALACE (Kakh-e Golestan) Weekdays 9-12 a.m., 4-6 p.m. Closed Fri. 30 Rls. Meidan Ark (Square). Tel: 537943, 530238, 532257. Palace of the Qajar dynasty set amid formal gardens. Remarkable collection of carpets and 19th century art in Throne Room. Also used for state ceremonies. (8-E) — 2 —

NATIONAL ARTS (Museum-e Honarhaye Mellî) Weekdays 9:30-12:30 a.m., 3-6 p.m. Closed Fri., Thurs. afternoons Weekdays 10 Rls. Fri. 5 Rls. Meidan Baharestan, Kamololmolk St. Tel: 316329. A treasure house of the finest art of Iran. Behind the museum are workshops open to the public of famous craft making. (6-G) — 6 —

PAHLAVI MUSEUM (Museum-e Pahlavi), Kakh St. between Parson and Sepah Aves. Also known as Marble Palace, (Kakh-e Marmar) it was the former residence of Reza Shah the Great. In lovely gardens, the palace has a striking collection of modern and 19th century paintings and relics. (6-C) — 14 —

SHAHYAD MONUMENT Built on the occasion of 2500th anniversary of founding of the Persian Empire in 1971. Weekdays 9 a.m. — 12 noon, 4-7 p.m. (Summer) 9 a.m. — 12 noon, 3-6 p.m. (Winter) 30 Rls. Fri. 15 Rls. Meidan Shahyad. Tel: 961041. Tehran's distinguishing landmark square. Panoramic view from tower. First floor museum and auditorium hall with spectacular cinematic film of Iran.

ARYAMEHR STADIUM, on Old Karaj Road, at a short distance from Shahyad Square. Open daily. One of Asia's best equipped sports fields with 100,000 seats. Facilities for 1974 Asian Olympics and 200,000 — meter lane.

CITY THEATER, in Pahlavi Park on corner of Pahlavi and Shahreza Aves. (5-D) Modern and Persian architecture. Open daily for tickets, cultural programs.

MAJLIS (Majles-e Shoraye Mellî), Lower House of Parliament, in former Qajar palace, at Baharestan Square. (6-F) Formal gardens and stunning mirror-mosaic rooms. Visits through INTVO or the Majlis office.

THE SENATE (Majles-e Sena), Sepah Ave. (6-C) Striking modern architecture, lovely carpets. Visits through INTVO.

ROUDAKI HALL, Arfa St. near Hafez Ave. (5-D) built for H.J.M. the Shahanshah Aryamehr's coronation in 1967, this artistic hall is Tehran's culture center. Modern Iranian art interior, fountain gardens. Open daily for tickets. Performing groups: Tehran Opera & Ballet. Companies: Tehran Symphony; Iranian Folklore Dancers; National Instrumental Musicians.

TEHRAN BAZAAR, Sabzeh Meidan, (8-E) south Tehran, is a 100-year-old lay-out of covered lanes, built in Gajar, offering endless arcades of exotic merchandise, pungent scents and colorful people add to the unique bustle.

SEPAHSALAR MOSQUE (Masjed-e Sepahsalar), Baharestan Square. (6-F) Always open to visitors. The most important mosque in Tehran, with theological school and famous 18,000-volume library. Built by Qajars in 1878 with 8 minarets, pleasing tilework. Worth a climb to the top of minaret for superb view.

TEHRAN UNIVERSITY, Shah Reza Ave., near 24th Esfand Square, Iran's largest university with 10 colleges, established in 1935, 25,000 students. Campus contains charming mosque and new central library worth a visit. Philharmonic Society concerts are often given at the Faculty of Fine Arts or at Ferdowsi Hall. (4-C)

ZURKHANEH (House of Strength). Not to be missed is this art of ancient Iranian athletics. Musclemen swing clubs to rhythmic chanting. Free demonstrations at Bank-e Mellî Zurkhaneh. (6-E) Sat., Mon., Wed. 5-6 p.m., Bank-e Mellî on Ferdowsi Ave. Tel: 313640. Also Jafari Zurkhaneh, (7-D) daily except Fri. at 5 p.m. Jafar Athletic Club, Park-e Shahr, Varzesh Ave. Tel: 666885.
