UNIFORM STATE HIGHWAY MARKERS

Interstate or United States Highways are designated by shield-shaped markers of white with black figures. The same number is used throughout their length, the state passed through being shown at the top of the shield.

Oklahoma state highways are designated by diamond-shaped yellow signs with black figures.

The octagonal sign is used to indicate "Stop," where for any reason such action is necessary.

The diamond shaped signs, commonly called "Slow" signs, are used to indicate any condition inherent in the road itself requiring slow speed and caution on the part of the driver.

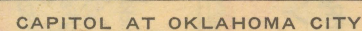
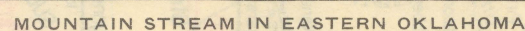
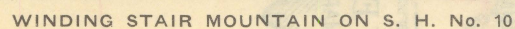
The circular sign is used as advance warning on the approach to crossings only.

The square shaped signs, commonly called "Caution" signs, are used to indicate any condition requiring caution that is not inherent in the road itself, but which is due to conditions or adjacent conditions which often are also intermittent.

COLOR—All signs of precautionary character, including the circular railroad sign, the occasional stop sign, the diamond slow signs, and the square caution signs have black designs on a yellow background.

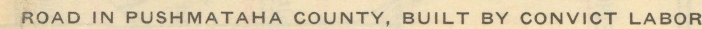
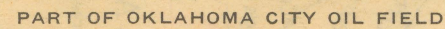
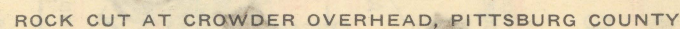
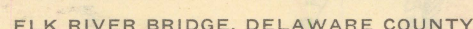
ALL direction, information and restriction signs are black on a white background

SYMBOLS—The symbols used on the various signs are those for railroad grade crossings, both for single and multiple tracks, for left and right curves and turns; for reversed curves and turns; the arrow on the directional sign and the arrow which accompanies the route marker.
