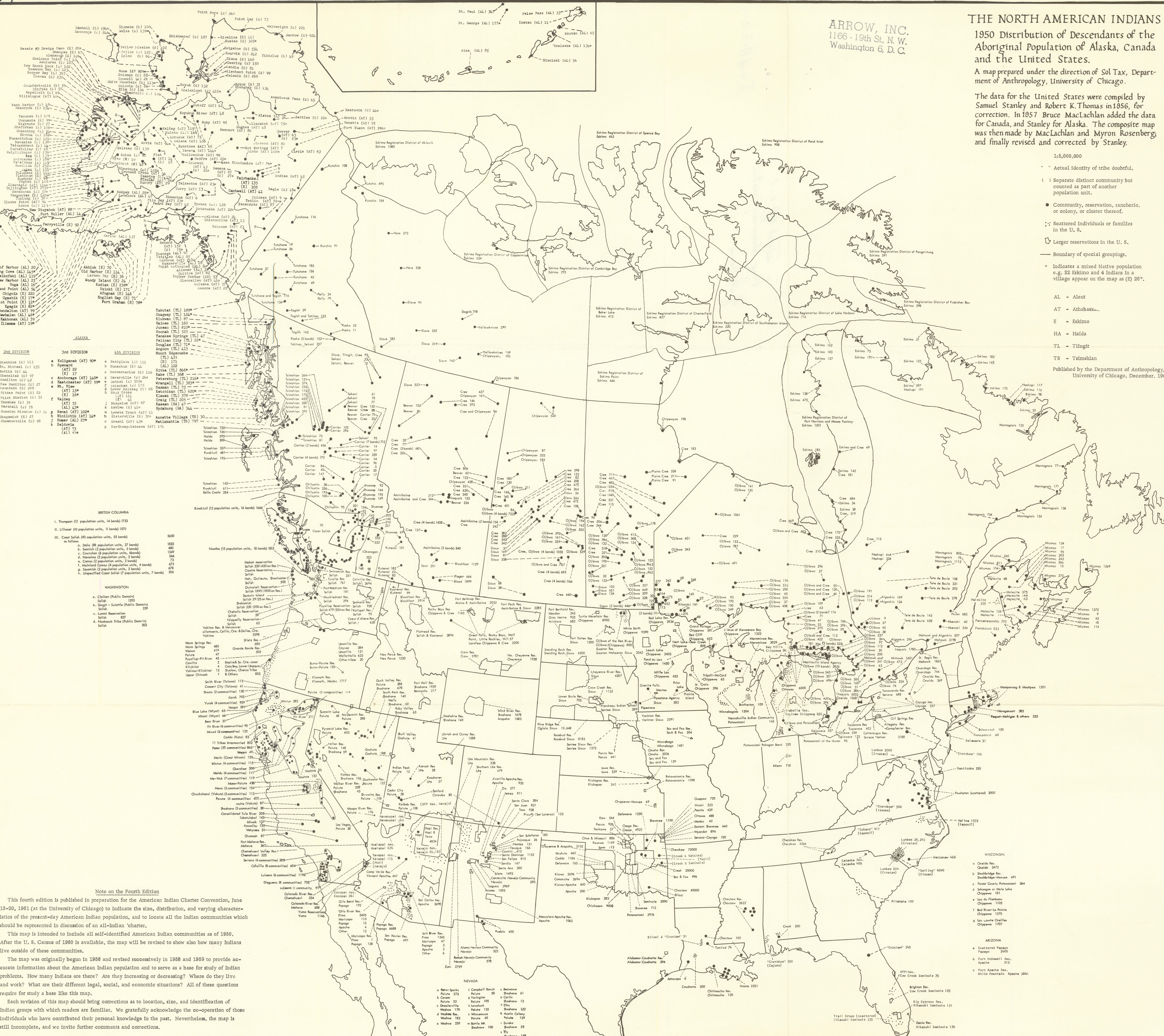

Note on the Fourth Edition

This fourth edition is published in preparation for the American Indian Charter Convention, June 18-20, 1961 (at the University of Chicago) to indicate the size, distribution, and varying characteristics of the present-day American Indian population, and to locate all the Indian communities which should be represented in discussion of an all-Indian charter.

This map is intended to include all self-identified American Indian communities as of 1950. After the U. S. Census of 1960 is available, the map will be revised to show also how many Indians live outside of these communities.

The map was originally begun in 1956 and revised successively in 1958 and 1959 to provide accurate information about the American Indian population and to serve as a base for study of Indian problems. How many Indians are there? Are they increasing or decreasing? Where do they live and work? What are their different legal, social, and economic situations? All of these questions require for study a base like this map.

Each revision of this map should bring corrections as to location, size, and identification of Indian groups with which readers are familiar. We gratefully acknowledge the co-operation of those individuals who have contributed their personal knowledge in the past. Nevertheless, the map is still incomplete, and we invite further comments and corrections.
